Officer's reports

President: Judy Lepley took questions from Ian Dobie regarding the shows we are planning to attend.

General Secretary: Stewart Lowthian added to his report that proxy voting suggested a caucus didn't want some of the national officers to remain in post but were not prepared to find candidates to supplant them. No questions were raised.

Editor: Bruce Lepley added to his report by stating that we need to use social media effectively which will require a team of volunteers. On a question from Charlie Hall regarding the frequency of publication Bruce stated that, as it would require a change to the Articles so it was down to the members. Robert Bensley questioned the wisdom of publishing less often, contending that it would impact on the success of social functions. Discussion regarding the use of social media followed with no conclusion being reached.

Social Secretary: Jim Bettley thanked the Northern Section for finding the venue. He gave an update on possible social events and asked for volunteers to lead ride-outs at the National Rally. He and the President need to meet with the Fire Service College to finalise details which will not stop the event taking place. The lack of support from BMW was commented on. He also stated that the 2024 National Rally was being organised and, on a question from the floor, stated that camping was available within walking distance. Difficulties with our relationships with dealers were raised, with the Northern Section's relationship with Bowker Motorrad being a welcome exception. Issues of member retention were raised with Dik Langan (East Anglia membership secretary) and Sue Ross (Western membership secretary) saying what actions they took when members didn't renew. Colin Ross gave the rough portion of new members that are retained after the first year as 30%.

Membership Secretary: Colin Ross thanked Dik Langan for his assistance with the membership database. He described how free memberships were to be processed. There were no questions on the subject. He continued to explain the change in the club's position on Journal insertions and that now they were simplified so that the cost of insertions in The Journal will be £0.78 per insertion, payable by the requesting section going forward. On a clarification from Ian Dobie, it was confirmed that the cost was £0.78 per member per insertion. Colin pointed out that this was still cheaper than the section independently posting such insertions by hand.

GS Register Secretary: Nev Jones's report was circulated with the agenda. No questions were raised.

Sporting Register Secretary: Robert Bensley's report was circulated with the agenda. Robert gave brief details of the current status of the track day bookings.

DVLA Liaison Officers: Robert Freeman's and Ken Buchanan's reports were circulated with the agenda. As neither was present, no questions could be asked.

Toolhire Officer: Mike Delacoe's report was circulated with the agenda. He noted that people were joining to access the toolhire scheme. He can make details of what has been hired available. No questions were raised.

Treasurer's report: Jim Lepley had nothing to add to his report except to say that nothing has improved. Ian Dobie questioned the 200% increase in the cost of the 2021 NEC show attended while he was President. Jim stated that this was during Covid and only a few members were signed up to offset the costs of attending. The 2022 show was much more successful. Dik Langan pointed out that the National Committee had voted to attend the event although numbers were expected to be low. It was suggested that we can't afford not to attend shows. On a proposal by Jim Lepley, seconded by Jim Bettley, it was agreed to accept the accounts with 97 votes in favour and 5 against.

Confirmation of accountants: Jim Lepley stated that the current cost of our accountancy and bookkeeping services is approximately two-thirds of the cost from our previous accountants 13 years ago. On a proposal by Jim Lepley, seconded by Dik Langan, it was agreed that Ross McConnell would be retained. Voting was 107 for and 2 against.



Confirmation of full member subscription: On a proposal from Jim Lepley, seconded by Jim Bettley, the proposal to raise the full member subscription from £32 to £35 was carried with 91 votes for and 8 against.

Confirmation of associate member subscription: On a proposal from Jim Lepley, seconded by Jim Bettley, the proposal to raise the associate member subscription from £3 to £4 was carried with 88 votes for and 10 against.

At this point Jim Bettley asked the members for their opinion on returning to the same venue in 2024. There was a consensus in favour.

Election of officers: As there were no contested posts Stewart Lowthian suggested that the meeting should follow the precedent set some years ago and save time by voting en bloc. This was accepted by 85 members with none against. All the candidates were thus duly elected.

Presentations:

After a short address detailing Cliff Batley's 18 years on the National Committee, five years as East Anglian rep then 13 years as a Vice-President missing only 2 or 3 meetings in all that time, Judy Lepley presented him with an engraved tankard as a token of the Club's appreciation for his time and dedication.

Robert Bensley accepted the Sporting Spirit trophy on behalf of Shaun Mulligan, who was not able to attend the meeting. Robert will present it to Shaun at the national rally in August.

Proposals to amend the MAA, each requiring a 75% majority to carry.

Stewart Lowthian explained the significance of a special resolution as the only way our Articles of Association could be changed. The two proposals were then discussed.

Proposal to amend Article 10: (Reverting to a fixed membership year) Colin Ross amplified his reasoning for proposing the change, adding that it was seconded by John Elvidge, his predecessor as National Membership Secretary. It was suggested from the floor that April would be a more appropriate time for renewals to take place. Colin responded by adding that approximately 50% of current members have an expiry date of 31st January making it the most effective choice. Questions of cost were raised and answered then a vote was taken. On a proposal from Colin Ross, seconded by John Elvidge, there were 82 votes for and 5 against the proposal. This is more than 75% for the proposal so it carried. Stewart Lowthian will amend the Articles of Association lodged with Companies House accordingly. The change in process will then be targeted for January 2024.

Proposal to amend Article 78: (Removing the word "Journal" from the cover of the magazine) Bruce Lepley explained his reasons for the proposal before inviting questions. Opinions for and against the proposal were raised by the members present. On a proposal by Bruce Lepley, seconded by Judy Lepley, there were 54 votes for and 41 against the proposal. As this is less than a 75% majority the proposal failed.

Date of next meeting: The 13th of April at the Canberra Club has been proposed.

Any Other Business:

Bob Ingram asked to make two points. His first was that Mike Delacoe is one of the Club's greatest assets and his second was to ask if it were possible to list the number of members in each section along with the count of those present.

The meeting closed at 14:50.

President's Report

It is now 2 years since Club Members elected a female President and despite dire predictions from a small number of people at the time The BMW Club is still alive and very much kicking. The Club has survived covid, the election of a female president and it will survive the increased costs caused by the economic situation after co-vid. However, I am concerned that there is a very small faction within the Club who seem hell bent on bringing the Club down.

Once again, this past year it has been a pleasure and a privilege to be part of the National Officers Team. Bruce, Colin, Jim B, Jim L and Stewart are a hardworking and diligent group who use their talents and knowledge to achieve the very best for our great Club.

The positive and forward looking feeling has continued throughout the Club. More activities and volunteers coming forward to organise them. Membership numbers steadily increasing over the past year.

As reported in the Journal the Club had a very successful presence at many Shows in 2023 and from reading reports and looking at the calendar many Sections plan to attend even more Shows in 2024. Attendance at these Shows and visits to Dealers brings our Club to the attention of the Motorcycling Fraternity and increases membership. Face to face contact with members and prospective members helps portray the positive image of our Club.

The Caledonia National Rally being held at Stirling University Venues in Scotland is well ahead in planning. It is unfortunate that, once again, we have not been able to find a venue that caters for both En-suite accommodation and camping. However, the lack of camping does not seem to be deterring members as bookings for the rally are dropping into Jim's in box and through the letter box daily.

I would remind Members that The BMW Motorcycle Club will be 75 years old in 2026 and if there is to be a rally which includes En-suite and camping a venue needs to be found and booked now.

The Club is very fortunate to have many volunteers who do a superb job for us without them there would be no Club and they all deserve a huge thank you from this AGM.

Our Club is moving forward and has a very bright future.

With the invaluable assistance of Judith Jones, Dik Langan, Judy Lepley and Piers Kurrien, we have produced a professional standard magazine each month on time, while also developing an actual digital version of it through a member only Facebook group page and managing all the pressures of our own private lives (saving lives for me!!).

I would like to take this opportunity to convey my apologies to the membership over the debacle of the FORMAL COMPLAINT brought against me by the Oxford Section Committee; This complaint originated from complete misunderstanding of the vote held at the 2023 AGM to remove from the MAA's the requirement for the magazine to be called the Journal and instead insert the wording 'Magazine of the B.M.W Motorcycle Club Ltd.', meaning it could still be called the Journal, just not be required to be. This misunderstanding in my opinion was further exacerbated by a select few attendees at the AGM filibustering during the discussion preceding the vote. This vote actually went in favour of removing the requirement but did not reach the required 75% to pass. The covers displayed on screen at the AGM were merely mock designs to show how it would look without the word 'Journal' on the cover, nothing more. The design of the front cover was set to change following the meeting in any case, and as you all will be aware, did change, however the word Journal was still emblazoned across the page, in a larger font size and taking up much

more of the page than it had been for the previous few years, albeit, with some backgrounds, a little obscured due to the colouring of the picture behind once printed (which is not something that is easily ascertained on a computer screen).

Steve Halliday on behalf of the Oxford Section Committee stating that my position as Editor was untenable, and requesting for me to step down immediately is a laughable situation, as every single point of their complaint was utterly incorrect and proven by our Vice Presidents as no complaint to answer. They then further pushed this and subverted the memberships wishes by ignoring the club's complaints procedure and tried to generate support for the insulting complaint by sending it out round the national committee and possibly further.

I hold no grudge; this complaint was fervently defeated; it was born of misunderstanding and misinformation. I would like to move forward from this near yearlong sorry situation and focus on making this club all it can be for its members, further build the membership, and display all your musings in a professional and innovative manner. The benefits of my Parents being members, and active officer bearers in this Club for a number of years are insurmountable, it keeps their brains ticking and their bodies moving, and I aim to support that as much as I am able, not only for them, but for every single one of you. I would urge you to book early as this is already proving popular and room availability is not unlimited.

My thoughts are already on a venue for the next AGM as well as any suitable venues for another national rally in 2025. I would like to thank those that have already been in contact with me and ask if anyone has any ideas of possible venues please let me know. Finding one that meets all of our needs is no easy task.

National Membership Secretary's Report.

2023 / 2024 has been a very active period for me, not just in producing the monthly mailing list for the Journal but other activities as highlighted below. The number of emails I receive from members asking questions or requiring their data to be updated in the database is significant when in most cases the member is able to update their own details by logging on to their record or by contacting their section membership secretary.

Fixed Membership Year: As you should be aware it was agreed at the 2023 AGM that the Club reverts from the rolling membership year to a fixed membership year where all expiry dates will be 31st January of a given year. Obviously to make this happen required an update to the database which has gone relatively smoothly which is down to the assistance provided by Dik Langan and Jim Lepley by accessing a development version of the database. Officially the fixed membership year kicked in on 1st November 2023 where members would pay a fee which would take their membership through to 31st January 2025. There was significant number of references to the change to the fixed year in various copies of the Journal yet I received emails asking "why when I renewed, I did not get a full year's membership" even though they paid a reduced fee. One of the reasons to revert to the fixed year was the potential of a cost saving as a result of the reduced number of "splits" throughout the year by the mailing house. By the 2025 AGM we should hopefully be able to see this benefit come to fruition.

Complimentary Membership: In my report for the 2023 AGM I made reference to this subject and the need to make certain changes. Effectively, this year I have taken responsibility for renewing the membership of club officials who fulfil a role at national level (23) and those that are honorary members (12). By one person taking this responsibility it makes it much easier for changes to the respective positions to be updated as necessary. With respect to the sections, they are each entitled to 3 complimentary membership which usually go to the section social secretary, secretary and treasurer, in all cases it is the responsibility of the section to keep their records updated.

Renewal forms forwarded with the January Journal: It came to light in early January that the mailing house had forwarded renewal forms with this Journal that defined the incorrect renewal fee. The process of defining the respective splits that the mailing house carry out is defined in the mailing list forwarded to the mailing house. On receipt the

mailing house then produce sample proofs for me to check for errors and approve. The renewal notices that I checked defined the correct membership fees therefore it was the responsibility of the mailing house as the forms forwarded were different to those approved. It was considered inappropriate that members that use the renewal form and pay by cheque should have to resend the cost difference and the following was agreed:

The mailing house would forward corrected renewal forms to all those listed to receive the form plus a covering letter from myself advising members of the issue and that anyone using the form to renew via their membership processor would pay the fee defined on the original renewal form.

The mailing house agreed cover the cost difference so the club did not lose out financially.

In total the mailing house were advised that 142 members had taken advantage of the error which amounted to a deficit of £462 +VAT which was subsequently credited to the club.

Members renewing online were not affected by the error as the fees defined were correct.

Late Journal Delivery: Over the past year this is becoming more and more of an issue. In particular the forwarding of the February Journal for those members that had renewed and their new membership cards was forwarded with the above Journal. The number of emails received from members advising they had not received their Journal was significant some of which were very pointed expecting I was would able to resolve the issue. When the problem was first reported contact was made with the mailing house who advised that all Journals were despatched in a single box on 29th January, it was then in the hands of Royal Mail to expedite delivery. As a result of receiving so many emails the mailing house, as the sender, were requested on 14/2/24 to lodge a formal complaint with Royal Mail, which they have done but at the time of writing there has not been any response. As of 16/2/24 members continue to advise that Journals had not been received. This is not a localised problem as members from Southern to Scottish section have advised of non receipt.

February 2023 BMW Club Rhino National Rally Beddgelert

September 2023 The Sorebutts Rally (A Western Section nominated event)

Once again a good time was had by all despite the wet weather bits. A firm favourite with members.

Touring 2023

During late 2022 insufficient interest was expressed in a tour of Wallonia in early 2023. As a result this European tour was removed from 2023's diary of events.

Touring 2024

A decision has been made to run a Tour of the Ardennes in May of 2024. Details available on the member's Facebook page, The club's website diary and the GS Register Facebook Page.

The National Rallies

These comprise The Welsh National Rally, The English National Rally and The Scottish National Rally. Many GS Register members have competed in these events in the past. All three are said to be running again in 2024 and we encourage members to have a go as they are enjoyable.

GS Register website

A competent volunteer is needed to run the website. In the absence of a volunteer a decision will need to be made whether to delete the current site. Maintenance is difficult and requires too much time.

We now have 2200 Facebook members on the GS Register Facebook page and more Facebook members joining every week.

DVLA & Historic Vehicles Officer's Report

In the last year, now that Covid has to a degree,

eased, that has enabled all of us to get out and about. Meaning that restoration projects under the bench, have resurfaced in the last 12 months. Between us, Ken & I have dealt with, or are still ongoing 93 new applications, that however does not include those outstanding from 2022, or even earlier! Ken handles 1980 – last week, so to speak, while I attempt to cover 1923 – 1980. Everyone is different, some 'sail through' but others have simply no documentation, or the VIN Numbers have been eaten by a 'Steel' Moth. Documentation may be from zero, to 'Full Kit & Rifle'. However, a 'Number Plate' is NOT evidence on its own.

Obviously, a very low %age do fall into the 'iffy' bracket. Has the Owner been scammed or taken for a ride? Or perhaps, if not a Registered Club Member, attempting to 'Pull a Fast One'. But I feel between us, we are savvy now on these blatant attempted frauds.

Having said that however, the 'Arthur Daley' TV Minder show 'Ethos' still exists, (I used to Act in that show, portraying a multitude of Characters over a long time). Even in the alleged 'High End' Car Market today! They have say an R90s, & attempt to wheedle out the Build Date F.O.C, Then sell, without contributing to 'Our Funds'. But as 'The Who' sang, 'I won't Get Caught Again'.

Manufacturers Headed Build Date Letters. These are now, in BMW 's case, a 'Thing of The Past'. These give a definitive Production / Build Date, and often delivery date to a Dealer. This enabled the Registration for say an import, or Barn Find, to satisfy the DVLA.

As an aside I do know of a 'Barn, not far from my Town, that entombs over 40 BSA's.

However, even at Euro 50.00, BMW felt Date Letters were uneconomic to produce. Then the DVLA

rejected these because they had a Computer-Generated Signature. Not personally 'hand signed'. It seems someone had been producing 'fake' documents to register vehicles using that Computer system. It Was Not BMW's.

However, The DVLA still give the occasional 'Gripe' because I / We, have NOT included a Manufacturers Date Letter. They are No More. But BMW will supply Ken and I with the 100% correct Build / Delivery. This we 'quote' with no problems.

I also have indexed the BMW Club Membership lists, 1951 – 73. These have proved invaluable, and they list Name, Address, Model of machine, and often Reg Number. Many Reg Numbers have been reclaimed this way. Recording these in Club Membership Records was discontinued in 1973 for the reason, which at the time was Sensible.

It took 'too long to type' every year'. But, of course, it could not be foreseen that 50 years on these would be 'Gold Dust'.

Finally, I do get, and welcome, enquiries BMW related, from an owner who wants a small part for a 19?? BMW. That usually requires a Dealer. Some I can recommend both in UK and Germany

Or, 'My Uncle Bill' had a BMW in 1948, his name was Etc.

So, I am happy to continue as I am. I do benefit from a Free Subscription. I do not, & never have, claimed any personal expenses. Though the club did fund £10.00 for 2 large Heavy Duty Plastic Storage containers to keep all the Clubs Book, Magazines etc safe and dry in my garage. They are clearly Marked, 'Property of The BMW Club'. My Family are aware. May I wish you all, many safe Happy Miles

We have had a busy year with lots of enquiries from owners of bikes built before the DVLA cutoff date for historic status that were registered months later, meaning that a support letter from us at the club proving the build date means they can save road tax and MOT. Luckily for this age of bike the German BMW archive in Munich is our go to place for confirmation of build date, and our contacts there are now very efficient, so we can turn these enquiries around in a matter of days - if all the photos of the bike, it's frame number and other documentation are in order of course.

The other type of enquiry we get is for often very new bikes that have been recently imported from abroad. While the owners of these usually have already got the required NOVA certificate, they come to us for help in getting it registered with the DVLA. Sometimes they have tried already and failed because they need DVLA approved proof of build date and have not been able to get it. This is the service we are trying hard to provide but are finding increasingly difficult. Recently a member has even had one of our support letters thrown out by the DVLA as not sufficient proof, even though this method was agreed between the DVLA first registration department and Robert Freeman only 18 months ago and has been working well since. As I write this in February, we are still trying to get an answer as to whether this is due to a breakdown in communication within the first registration department of the DVLA, or whether they are moving the goal posts once again.

To compound the problem of getting a new bike registered here, we have to go to BMW UK to get proof of build date, which can take a long time to get a reply, if at all. Talking to our local BMW dealer has unfortunately not helped, with them reporting a similar problem when dealing with head office.

Tool Hire Secretary's Report

2023 was quite a busy year!

From Jan 2023 to Dec 2023, 56 members used the scheme. Between them they hired 269 tools, 105 more than in 2022. Ten members hired tools on more than one occasion.

2023 was a year some members decided their bikes were due a bit of in-depth work. Complete sets of tools for engine, gearbox and rear drive were sent out, giving our posties a bit of manual exercise when it came to the final delivery leg!

As in recent years the most hired tool in 2023 was again the GS-911 Diagnostic devices which were sent out 18 times.

Tools were requested for following range of models:

- Pre'69 era (R27, R50/2, R60/2, R69S),
- Post 1969 airhead models (R60/5, R75/6, R90/6, R80/7, R100RS/RT)
- K1200 (Brick)
- F700 & F800
- R1100 & R1150
- R1200/R1250

The club's toolbox has been topped up a little by getting some more old airhead tools and manuals, plus buying the correct cam alignment tools for the R1250 shift cam. A second GS-911 WiFi tool was bought from a member who won it in the National Rally raffle.

Technology Officer's report

What a busy year with the Membership Database we have had and that has certainly taken the bulk of my attention this year. As you will be aware we have switched back to a fixed renewal date for all members. Whilst I am not the programmer who made the actual changes (we pay a separate company, Laser Red, for that) I am their main interface with the Club. Also because of my IT background I plan and carry out much of the testing before we let them install any changes on to the live system. On the whole it has gone well but has taken a lot of effort from myself and I have been very ably assisted by Jim Lepley and Colin Ross (who's roles mean they need to be involved in fundamental changes like this).

This has meant that I have been very glad of the Club email system behaving well with most club officers (national and sections) able to access their Club emails from their own computers and smart phones. Obviously with the change of officers around October (with all the section AGMs taking place) there were some new folk needing a helping hand getting it set up but most found it relatively intuitive.

The Forum has settled down after the big upgrade and appears to behaving well under the assured administrations of John King and Andrew Hughes. We still get a lot of trouble makers trying to register (from abroad) but I implemented a system that blocks the majority of those and the rest are filtered out by John and Andrew.

The VCR site has not demanded attention other than the occasional new user needing approving, it would be nice to spend some time getting that site a little more "active" but its very nature is one of reference source and to be honest we don't get a lot of new references to add to it.

This year I hope to follow up the online Mutual Aid form on the National site with a similar one for the DVLA requests which should save a bit of effort of the wonderful team (Robert, Ken and Cathy) who are just gathering a list of the questions they ask almost every requestor when it first comes in.

My philosophy is that the more we can automate the less time we spend doing menial tasks and the more time we can all spend riding our bikes, so if you think of a repetitive task you do as a volunteer for the club and think it might be done better by a computer just let me know.

Treasurer's report

I attach a copy of the latest information duly updated on 1st March 2024.

The following was part of my report to the NC meeting in February

Our deficit for 2022/2023 increased from £23,241.00 to £36,015.00. The Club will not be able to continue if we do not halt this increase. The main reasons are that:

- In the previous year 2021/2022 we had no national rally and limited activities. In this year track days made a profit of approximately £650, other activities with a much larger turnover incurred costs to the Club, mainly £2,600.00 spent on the National Rally as allocated during the AGM of 2022 and unexpected expenses of almost £500 on our attendance at the Founders Day event.
- Journal printing increased by £5,000.00 and mailing and posting increased by about £2,000.00. I should explain that the increase in mailing includes a huge element of posting now. The decrease in posting costs is a result of transferring the activity of actually paying for posting of the Journals through a different system that means the mailing house is now paying for all of the postage as well. So, in future the posting costs will reduce to zero. Thanks to Colin Ross and his investigative skills that found this method of reducing overall cost.
- Database costs up from £3,000.00 to £11,000.00. These costs are related to database maintenance and modification to the fixed year again to reduce the mailing costs.

Looking forward the National Committee have decided to dispense with the June Meeting (we will hold a virtual meeting if needed) which means I expect a total cost saving of £6,000.00 to £7,000.00. The Database and maintenance costs should re-

duce to around £5,500.

In order to maintain our ongoing activities and continue to produce our monthly magazine I must request an increase of subscription this year of £5.

I note that Section Holdings have increased from £64,324 to £67,986, and despite this some sections have requested and with the agreement of a small majority of the NC obtained agreement of an increase in capitation of £1 per member. This means that the subscription rate from 1st October will be £41 for U.K. members and £46 for overseas to cover this 20% increase in income for the sections.

I ask for two votes to be caste in respect of the subscription increase.
